"Rage and wrath, these are abominations, yet a sinner holds on them. The vengeful person will face the Lord's vengeance, for he keeps a strict account of their sins." (Sir.27:30)

Ben Sira speaks powerfully God's word about anger.

There is very little in our lives as dangerous on our journey to Eternity as the **hidden shoals of anger**. It is shipwreck for our souls when we run aground on these feelings so often rooted in deep hurts. Sometimes these are not just shoals under the surface but hidden volcanoes, ready to spew out wrath and bitterness. It breaks my heart as a spiritual father to see how many families are divided by acrimony and anger.

Yet there are reasons to be angry. Our Divine Saviour revealed that there is in God a pure anger when he drove the money changers from the Temple. This is the **anger that comes from Loving**. If you love someone and witness their being hurt by others or themselves then love becomes sad ... and **sad becomes mad**. This is a feeling. But it is a dangerous feeling because if not properly expressed then it becomes very perilous.

St. Paul puts it clearly: "Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and do not make room for the devil." (Eph. 4:25)

It is simple: do not treasure anger. Do not bury it deeply. Do not nurture this feeling of mad/sadness storing it away like a weapon for a future moment. Anger disorders us, and disorder is the devil's playground.

Yet ours are times that cultivate such sinful anger. Our movies and news eagerly portray anger and violence. It seems that days of civil conversation and collaboration have been replaced by suspicion and competition. Anger is the fuel of politics. Anger traps those who see themselves as victims. Anger enriches the profiteers who sell weapons for wars and advertisement space for voyeurs who confuse fury with feeling.

There is only one way out of this destructive anger: **Jesus Christ**. It is the way of being forgiven by Jesus. Let's face it, most people – most Catholics I venture to say – have not experienced the Forgiveness that comes from Jesus in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. People have not encountered the unbelievably generous mercy of our God who, like the king in todays parable, forgave the overwhelming debt (10000 talents=200000 years of labour = \$4.7 billion) of a servant. We dissect and analyze the reasons for our brokenness, we justify our mistakes, we try and "forgive ourselves", or we presume upon God's forgiveness – but those who do not practice the saving faith of the Church do not know the utter forgiveness of God in the Sacrament of Mercy.

If one is not forgiven then one cannot forgive. If one cannot forgive then one is held by "rage and wrath." If one brings "rage and wrath" to the Lord then one shuts off the Lord "merciful and gracious" (Ps. 102)

This is not us. Ours is the grace of being forgiven, of knowing the One who forgives.

And so our anger goes away for the sun sets.


