#### WINTER WHEAT - Getting Ready for the (next) Harvest

Swathing and combining are well underway. In some places a bumper crop, in others the sad effects of drought. Such is the way of we who live humbly with the reality of nature and its cycles.

How great it is that we have collaborated with the Creator in stewarding the earth to bring forth food. How much we have to learn still about distributing food as did our Lord with the multitude so that no one is left hungry. But we try – indeed, I witness your generosity.

I am a spiritual director for a young man who is set on studying

for the ordained priesthood – pray for him please – meanwhile, he is well on the way to becoming an expert in the study of soils as an agronomist. Pretty appropriate foundation for becoming a Spiritual Father I think. I have only become a "prairie boy" since my ordination – my experience was that of city life during the school year and the forests of north-central Saskatchewan during the summer (it was glorious!). My first assignment in Viscount and Meacham came with a crash course in prairie farming. I particularly liked farm lunches in harvest time (obviously).

One mystery that struck me was that of "winter wheat". Imagine, planting wheat that needs cold to produce heads! That is a bit of a risk (I think) but the wheat it produces is of the higher gluten protein necessary for ... PASTA! Truly, this is holy ground around us.

Harvesting and planting – happening together. So for our prairie land and so for our parish.

We are growing all the time. Not only families having children, visitors dropping in, but also new families are arriving – from India, Pakistan, Philippines, Peru, Lebanon ... praise God. Gathering in such a great harvest we also looking to plant winter wheat.



The **Bishop's Annual Appeal** gets underway next Sunday – a time to rejoice that we can seed with our resources for a new harvest, seed by supporting the work of the sowers of the Word in our Diocese.

Having just received the approval for our <u>Renovation Project</u> to proceed to the next stage, St. Paul's Parish continues its 118-year-old mission of being a Holy Temple of God from which the Living Temple of the Church sends forth missionary disciples.

We are labourers who have been given pay beyond all our desserts: Holy Communion. We do not grumble along with the tired workers of the Parable in today's Gospel – we turn around and pour some of our pay back into the ground of the Lord's fields. We are Saskatchewan folk who live in hope for next year.

Hope that is every seed of Winter wheat – ready to be harvested for the Bread of Life.



"In truth, I vow to you, Jesus my Saviour, that as far as I have the strength, I will never fail to accept the grace of martyrdom, if someday you in your infinite mercy should offer it to me, your unworthy servant" [From the spiritual diaries by St. John de Brébeuf]

St. John de Brébeuf, a Jesuit priest from France, came to Canada in 1625 to bring the Word of God to the peoples of New France. He labored among the Huron people, living with them, and compiled the first dictionary and catechism in their language.

Gradually others joined the mission, including St. Isaac Jogues. At that time, the Iroquois were at war with the Hurons, and saw the French missionaries as allies of their enemies. The Jesuits were taken captive and tortured. St. Isaac Jogues was kept as a slave for over a year, but was eventually ransomed and sent back to France with mutilated hands. This did not keep him from the mission, and he returned to Canada attempting to negotiate a peace treaty. In the village of Ossernenon, he and layman Jean de la Lande were captured and

Fr. Antoine Daniel, a companion who had a gift for teaching and for music, was next. Warriors attacked the village and set fire to the church. It is said that he was thrown inside to burn with his flock.

The next year, Fr. John de Brébeuf was kidnapped, and the martyrdom that he had vowed to accept from the time of his youth came to be. In the utmost cruelty, he was martyred along with companion Fr. Gabriel Lalemant. Frs. Charles Garnier and Noël Chabanel were killed within the same year.

Later, the man who killed St. Isaac Jogues was baptized and took the name "Isaac". And, 10 years later, in the very same village where Isaac Jogues and his companions were martyred, a baby girl was born who would become the first Indigenous Saint: Kateri Tekakwitha.

Let us thank God for these 8 courageous and faithful men, for "the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church"
